To my Franciscan Family: Preparation for the Upcoming General Chapter

Recently, I was forwarded a message from our Minister General asking our help in a major project by CIOFS (our International Council) to gather information at the local level and submit it to CIOFS. It has been over 40 years since local fraternities have been asked for their input. That last occurred when our Rule of 1978 was being produced in the 60's Because of the importance of this project by CIOFS, the St. Francis Regional

executive Council has let National know that we will submit complete responses to the questions that CIOFS has requested. In order to accomplish this, St. Francis Region will utilize all the Spiritual Assistants, Formators with Certificates and those now attending the Lay Spiritual Assistant/ Formator sessions and assign them as facilitators. They will be assigned to local fraternities and conduct

Dear Brothers and Sisters:
May the Lord give you peace!

In order to be fruitful and become a strong moment of grace for the entire Order, the upcoming General Chapter must be preceded by:

- * intensive and constant prayer in all the fraternities throughout the world, so that the Spirit of God our Lord can assist the capitulars of each country in allowing themselves to be guided by Him for the wellbeing of the Order and for the validity of the mission entrusted to the Franciscan Secular Order;
- * a serious intellectual preparation

For the first objective, the CIOFS Presidency has diffused the text of a prayer (*page 9*) to be recited in the entire Order. For the second objective the Presidency has prepared an introductory document on the theme of the Chapter: “The Profession of the Secular Franciscans and their sense of belonging to the SFO”, which we are here attaching, with the purpose of stimulating within the Secular Franciscan

Order a global reflection to help in the individual (international councillor) and collective (all the members and the fraternities of our Order) preparation to the Chapter.

The national councils and the international councillors, in particular, are asked to divulge this important working tool and assure that it is the object of attentive reflection in their national fraternity; it is, in fact, essential that the maximum attention be given to the preparatory phase of the general Chapter so that, with the help of the Holy Spirit, it will achieve its purpose and define the objectives of the Order for the next six years.

I would like to particularly ask the international councillors to adequately prepare themselves for this important event and commit themselves to studying in all earnest the theme of the Chapter. Only then can they truly fulfil their institutional responsibilities and become authentic and prepared representatives of their national and international reality.

I confide in each and every one of you, and on behalf of the Presidency and the general Secretariat I wish all my brothers and sisters in the world a Happy Easter.

We had a visitation from NAFRA at our annual meeting in January of the fraternity ministers in St. Francis Region.

Below, is the letter sent to St. Francis Region by Patrick Mendes, SFO, our National Minister and Fraternal Visitor that contains his observations of St. Francis Region.

Please note Patrick's remarks on:

- The validation of the Formation programs was strongly commended.
- The National visitors were impressed with our Seminar program and asked us to share the videos, PowerPoint presentation and reference work with the rest of the Regions in the USA.
- In Patrick's Recommendation part of the letter, he "strongly supports and encourages us to continue those dynamic ongoing formation workshops."
- Our involvement in Franciscan courses and workshops was endorsed and encouraged. They loved the fact that we were including scholarships as a line item in our annual budget.
- Our progress in Ethnic diversity was recognized.
- In the summation our

communication with the local fraternities was lauded.

- The National visitors were very happy with the ethnic diversity represented on the Regional Executive Council.
- Fr. Kevin Quelly, TOR, our NAFRA Pastoral Visitor, was also our Pastoral Visitor three years ago. At that time, he expressed disappointment in the make up of the Regional Executive Council. At the last election, I brought this up to the fraternity ministers and they responded. They elected a Korean/English speaking Councilor, a Vietnamese/English speaking Councilor and a Spanish/English speaking Councilor to the Regional Executive Council. That is why he and Patrick were so happy about the present make up of

Patrick Mendes, SFO, National Minister conducted the Fraternal Visitation of St. Francis Region concurrently with the Pastoral Visitation conducted by National Spiritual Assistant, Fr. Kevin Queally, TOR.

Preparatory information :

The pre-visitation questionnaire was very thoroughly and thoughtfully completed and received by the visitors prior to the date of visitation. We thank the Regional Executive Council for their diligent work.

Demographics:

Canonically established fraternities:	32
Emerging Fraternities:	2
Newly forming groups:	6
Professed brothers and sisters:	953

Spiritual Assistants:	29

Records:

Regional Directory of Local Fraternities and Ministers provided and up to date. Regional Norms: Well developed and up-to-date. There were a few additions and amendments voted upon and enacted by the Regional Fraternity at this Chapter. Permanent Minutes: Reviewed by the fraternal visitor. They are well organized and reflect the work of the Regional Executive Council. Treasurer's books and reports: These are meticulous; easy to review and reflect careful stewardship of the Region's financial resources.

Newsletter:

The Regional newsletter is called *The Joy of Francis*. It is very polished and well done. It is published three times yearly and is posted on the Region's website. The editor is to be commended for a job well done!

Apostolic activities:

The brothers and sisters are very active in the ministries of their parishes and participate in such activities as feeding the hungry and caring for the poor. The Region is very supportive of Amazon Relief among its other works of mercy. There are 2 Youth and Young Adult Groups in the Region.

Formation:

The Region has been working in a very focused way on issues of formation. They have a solid program in place and are highly successful at reaching the majority of their fraternities. There is genuine enthusiasm for the programs in place. The Council is to be commended for their dedication and hard work. Their efforts are bearing good fruit. There are a variety of opportunities for on going formation which are encouraged by the Regional leadership. One of

the sisters is presently enrolled in the ICFL program from St. Francis University in Pennsylvania and is very enthusiastic about the course. She shared her impressions with the community gathered.

The Fraternal visitor made the community aware of both ICFL and the Summer SFO Workshop sponsored by St. Francis University, Loretto, PA and endorsed by the National Executive Council.

Ethnic Diversity:

The Region is very ethnically diverse and the ethnic fraternities of the Region are flourishing and growing with excellent support from the Regional Executive Council. The fraternal visitor had the opportunity to have dinner and visit informally with the leadership of the various ethnic fraternities of the Region. The brothers and sisters are very enthusiastic, sharing and welcoming. They genuinely enjoy each other and even though they speak several different languages, the communication is warm, friendly and sharing. They genuinely enjoy each other's company as well as that of the English speaking community.

Summation:

This is a vibrant and healthy region which is definitely **on the GROW!!** Including the several vibrant newly forming and emerging groups, they will soon have some 40 fraternities in the Region. The leadership has done a lot to ensure communication and sharing of opportunities for growth in our Franciscan spirituality and charism. District liasons provide a readily available resource as well as a link to the REC. They put themselves at the service of the fraternities in their respective districts.

The pastoral and fraternal visitors met with the Regional Executive Council on the evening prior to the Chapter. We discussed their concerns and hopes for the Region. The REC works well together and the ethnic diversity of the Region is well represented on the Council.



The REC is very supportive of the re-visioned structure of the Apostolic Commissions and the Regional Minister took time to explain the implementation as well as our participation in the Franciscan Action Network and what it means to us as members of the larger Franciscan Family.

The region is blessed with many resources, such as the ability to record workshops and presentations etc. We encouraged them to share these resources as they are able, with other regions with fewer resources. The Region's response to this suggestion was very positive and enthusiastic.

Of the three First Order obediences to which fraternities of the Region are bonded, only one, the Conventual Friars have appointed a Regional Spiritual Assistant. There is a paucity of friars and Franciscan Sisters in the Region and the Region has moved very proactively in preparing lay spiritual assistants to fill the gap. The program is highly successful and would serve well as a model for other Regions.

Recommendations:

I strongly support and encourage you to continue these dynamic on going formation workshops and I do encourage the Regional Minister to share information about the approaches and methods used by the Region with other Regions - perhaps ideally at the National Chapter of NAFRA as well as using the list serve.

Continue to promote servant leadership development through workshops throughout the Region. An additional approach I would suggest is that Ministers at both the local and Regional level do role modeling/mentoring by inviting interested brothers and sisters to attend a REC or local fraternity council meeting on occasion. The opportunity provides insight into servant leadership in action. A word of caution - invite only 1 or 2 persons at any one time. This allows you to give 1:1 attention to the guest and will not disrupt the work of the Council.

Worthy of your consideration, given the rapid growth of the Region and the great geographic distance covered by the Region, begin to think about and prepare for the time when it will be best for you to "parent" a new third Region for California. Begin to have the outline of a plan in place.

In conclusion I want to express my sincere thanks to the brothers and sisters of the Region and the Council for your warm welcome, hospitality and complete cooperation. It has been a wonderful experience of fraternity for me.

ST. FRANCIS REGION SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Exciting things continue to happen in our Order and in our Region. Because so many opportunities are being given to us to broaden our knowledge, enhance our Franciscan education and deepen our spirituality, the Regional Executive Council decided to create a scholarship fund to assist our Franciscan brothers and sisters in attending some of these programs. In the budget adopted by the Regional Fraternity at the January annual meeting, \$1,000 was allotted for Scholarships. Obviously that is only a token amount which will not go very far, but it emphasizes the importance we believe it should have.

As an example of programs which assist with our own ongoing formation and give us better tools to help in all the formation programs there is an extensive program offered by mail through St. Francis University in Loretto, Pennsylvania, called Institute for Contemporary Franciscan Life. There are a total of eight courses offered; six of them are \$350 each, and two are \$150 each. Each person who enrolls is assigned a mentor from the ICFL faculty, which includes some distinguished friars, sisters, and SFOs. The Kaleidoscope Institute in Los Angeles, which provided the two speakers we all enjoyed at our Regional Gathering in October, offers outstanding training in multiculturalism.

A National Formation Workshop will be given in Missouri in mid-

May featuring Teresa Baker, SFO, national formation director, Anne Mulqueen, SFO (former national formation team and now our International Councilor), and Fr. Richard Trezza, OFM. The cost of room and board for that meeting is \$260 (double room). A seminar entitled "Development of Lay leadership in the Secular Franciscan Order" will be given in June at St. Francis University, by Fr. Bernard Tickerhoof, TOR and Anne Mulqueen, SFO. The cost of that seminar is \$225 registration, and \$170 room and board (double room). In September, in Michigan, a Congress for Spiritual Assistants will take place, featuring the four national spiritual assistants teamed with four SFOs. The cost of that Congress is \$300.

All of these programs are highly recommended, but as you can see, all require funding. There are also transportation costs to get to the various locations. Yet, everyone who is able to take any of the courses will not only find them of great personal benefit but will be able to better assist with formation in their own and other fraternities.

In addition to these, when Rock, Fr. Steve and I had the opportunity to meet in February with Fr. Mel Jurisich, OFM Provincial, we were told by Fr. Mel that while the province simply cannot provide spiritual assistants to us because of their lack of numbers, they do have friars with great expertise in Franciscan spirituality who can and will provide seminars, such as the ones above, for us so that we can learn from them to take full control of and manage our own Order. So

you can see that there is a desperate need for a viable scholarship fund so that we can send people to such programs.

Therefore, if your fraternity has been fortunate enough to receive bequests and other donations that have enlarged your treasury beyond your own needs, please give serious consideration to making a donation towards the Region scholarship fund. If you are not so blessed, you might be inclined to hold fund-raisers for the Fund. We ask that you discuss this among your fraternities as you pray for guidance in the wise use of the funds entrusted to you and consider the Scholarship Fund for a donation.

Through the Southern California Gas Company's *Season of Giving Program*, a corporate campaign in support of employee's working with charitable nonprofit organizations — but primarily in response to the efforts of the SFO fraternities of St. Francis and St. Clare of Hemet, and St. Padre Pio of Moreno Valley, a check in the amount of \$1000.00 was presented to Linda Rodgers, Executive Director of the Valley Restart Shelter.

Valley Restart Shelter in Hemet is a 24-hour facility open every day of the year to provide housing and food to people in need. The Shelter's mission is to provide essential services to families, adults, and children who lack basic resources

to sustain themselves within the community.

Over the past year, actually over many years, the two SFO fraternities have taken responsibility for providing dinner on the 3rd Monday of every month. Other churches and organizations work to help provide dinners on other nights, and according to Linda, she does not know how she could make it through without that help.

I was Blind but Now I See...

A Lenten Day Retreat with Michael Harvey, OFM and Jose Marcos Gonzalez, OFM

On Saturday, March 8, the Social Concerns Office and Office of Small Faith Communities of the Diocese of San Bernardino sponsored a Lenten retreat day entitled, *That I May See*, at the Diocesan Pastoral Center. Over 150 persons participated.

It was unique to my experience in that we started with the Liturgy of the Word, the homily was the retreat experience and we ended the day with the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

Fr. Jose Marcos Gonzalez, OFM, of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, was retreat director for the Spanish-speaking, and he guided participants to mine scripture for spiritual insight. Fr. Michael Harvey, OFM, pastor of SS

Simon & Jude parish in Huntington Beach, was retreat director for English speaking participants. He helped us to identify “who God is in our lives” and “how we respond to sin and temptation.” Their presentations of Franciscan theology and spirituality were presented in a truly spirit-filled, thought provoking manner for both groups.

Fr. Michael began with a picture of the pool of Siloam where Jesus healed the blind man. Fr. Michael said that we should embrace our own blindness, trust and follow Jesus so that we might be healed.

After leading us in a breathing meditation to get us quieted, centered and focused, he shared that it is a true miracle when we finally wake up to what God has always meant for us to be! We can do this when we take time to be connected to the Divine. Then he told us a story about a beggar who had been sitting on an old box by the roadside for 30 years begging for spare change. A passerby asked the man if he had ever looked in the box. The beggar replied, “No, what’s the point, there is nothing in there.” The stranger insisted he look inside and when the beggar pried it open, he was astonished to find it filled with gold. Fr. Mike asked us to look inside ourselves to discover

the treasure God put there.

After a brief cosmology introduction to get us out of our myopic viewpoint, he asked for our definitions of God. Then he took us through what is called “Sandbox Theology,” that quite a few Catholics are stuck in. This views God as angry, or the big policeman in the sky who’s just waiting to catch us in sin so he can damn us to hell, etc., etc.

He introduced us to St. Francis of Assisi and the *Canticle of Brother Sun*, followed by an introduction to St. Clare. He told us that 80% of Catholics and all Protestants follow Dominican / Scholastic Theology. This is the theology espoused by St. Thomas Aquinas and St. Augustine. The starting point of this theology is Good Friday and the Crucifixion and the emphasis is on sin. The other 20% of Catholics follow Franciscan Theology as taught by Francis, Clare, St. Bonaventure, and Blessed Duns Scotus that starts with Christmas and

the Incarnation with the emphasis is on Grace and Original Blessing.

Fr. Michael took us through a basic introduction to Franciscan Theology and spirituality. He told us the best, least wrong description of God, Jesus, the Holy Spirit and the Sacraments was one word, LOVE. After showing us an Icon of the Holy Trinity in which the one viewing it is placed in the middle of all that LOVE. He ended with a quote from Teilhard de Chardin who said,

Someday, after mastering the winds, the waves, the tides and gravity, we shall harness for God the energies of love, and then, for the second time in the history of the world, we will have discovered fire.

Fr. Mike spoke of ORIGINAL sin and ORIGINAL GRACE, pointing out that the state of GRACE is the position of openness, receptivity, and vulnerability to the presence of

God. What keeps us from GRACE is SIN, defined as the fracturing of a relationship. After a discussion on what constitutes sin, he asked the question, “What is Heaven? What is Hell?” He quoted St. Gregory of Nysa who said, “Heaven and Hell are exactly the same thing—the love of God.” He went on to say that everything is in God, therefore Hell is in God, for nothing exists outside of God. When we asked, “What was God doing in Hell,” he answered by saying, “He is loving the people there.”

The rest of the day was taken up discussing, “The Three Centers of Intelligence” and the Seven Deadly Sins plus two (the patterns of behavior

the Amazon River. The poverty in the region can hardly be described. Many children and families live in overcrowded shacks, built on stilts over perpetually fermenting sewage. MAKING BEQUESTS

Some of our fraternities have recently been fortunate in receiving bequests from people who remembered the fraternity in their Will. Many educational institutions and charitable organizations have long encouraged their alumni or members, and others, to remember the school or charity in their Wills. We would like to bring this means of making gifts to the Order to the attention of our brothers and sisters. Our Scholarship Fund could benefit greatly from such bequests, and would allow us to leave something for those who follow in our footsteps as Secular Franciscans. You should consult your attorney to draw up a Will, but the language set out below can be used to identify the recipient of any bequest you would like to make in your Will.

I, (name), of (city, state, ZIP), give, devise and bequeath to St. Francis Region of the Secular Franciscan Order of the U.S., located in Southern California, the sum of [written amount or percentage of estate or description of property] for the Region's Scholarship Fund.

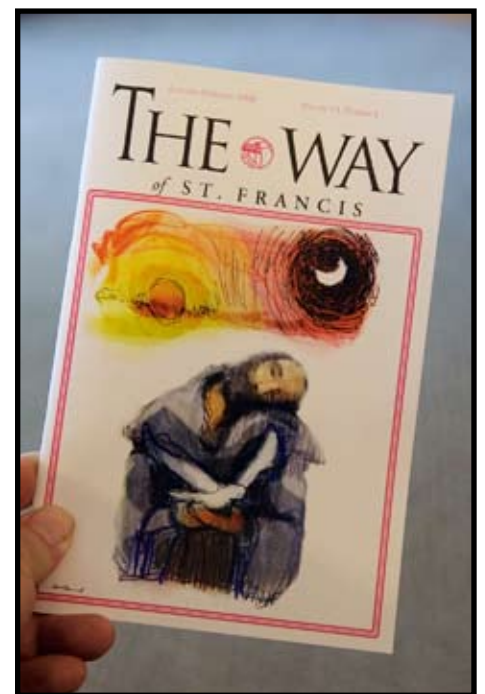
If you wish to leave the gift to honor someone, you can add language such as: "in honor of (name)" or "in memory of (name)." You could also specify that a scholarship be awarded in that person's name. Sometimes a person will leave a large sum, and specify that a scholarship (in any amount, or in a specific amount)

be awarded annually to someone in the decedent's name or in the name of someone the decedent wanted to honor. Occasionally with large gifts, the giver will specify that the principal be held and only the interest used to give annual (or other) scholarships.

Please consider our regional Scholarship Fund in your Will, knowing that it will benefit many of our brothers and sisters in the future.

that blind us from Grace). The two deadly sins added to the original seven were Fear and Deceit.

In the discussion of the seven deadly sins plus two, Fr. Michael pointed out that each dominant sin in our life is a result of a particular lost essential quality in childhood combined with a compensating belief or mask which results in the pattern that keeps us from GRACE. He showed which Grace or Virtue was needed to overcome that particular dominant sin. He concluded saying

The work of conversion is seeing the world as it is, and not as it appears from inside the box my basic sin has created, causing me to see through the lens/mask of my sin.

We then celebrated the Liturgy of the Eucharist and I have to say from a personal point of view that I never have been so profoundly moved by any day, weekend, weeklong retreat that I have ever attended as I was by this particular day. I would like to end this article with a quote that Fr. Michael used at the end of his presentation. Thomas Merton said,

The beginning of love is to let those we love be perfectly themselves, and not to twist them to fit our own image. Otherwise we love only the reflection of ourselves we find in them.

The success of this year's retreat has guaranteed that next year, on March 7 and 14, 2009, a Lenten retreat will be held based upon the Catholic Social Teaching: *Care for God's Creation*.
