Capuchin Franciscan Identity

Our world today is a little more complicated than it was in 1528. Ever since the discovery of electricity our world has been progressing faster and faster. The cars are faster; technology is faster. It's no wonder that this upcoming generation struggles with identity. I remember back in the late 70's and early 80's it seemed strange to hear someone say that they are trying to find themselves. Though in full disclosure I found myself asking God, "Who am I". I remember being caught between who the Kip Ledger was that God created and who the Kip Ledger was that I had created before I joined the Order. I suppose like John Travolta in "Grease" I settled into a little of both. Though I don't ever remember being confused as to what a Capuchin was. I was always pretty confident in that. I'm not saying I was always correct, just confident in my own mind. I hope my understanding has grown over the last 30 years.

I suppose "back in the day" (1528), when the Capuchins first began it was a lot easier. The Capuchins lived the hermetical expression of the Franciscan tradition. After all, St. Francis actually wrote a way of life for Franciscan Hermits. Or was it that easy???

Purgation: Gaze

A Rough Start

The Capuchin Franciscans certainly had a rough start. Our founder, Matteo Da Boscio, was accused of being a deserter from the Observant Franciscans only to be bounced around between the Duchess of Camarino, the Observant Franciscans and the Conventual Franciscans until we finally wrote our own constitutions in 1536. Shortly after our humble beginning three of our founders left the Order, some for the Protestant Reformation. Then we were barely able to get our feet on the ground when in 1563 the Council of Trent forced us into monasticism. It seemed that only by the grace of the Holy Spirit were we able to persevere living in monasteries for the next 400 years. You can still see etched on the side of some of our friaries, "Capuchin Monastery" or even "Capuchin Fathers" as if only priests were Capuchins.

Illumination: Consider

In 1963 when the Vatican II Council explained that we can **now** go back to the original charism of our founder, it would only make sense that there were a lot of feelings, emotions and thoughts going through the hearts and minds of all the Capuchin friars. In the 1960's up through the 1990's there were some friars in protest of what the Capuchins had become during those 400 years, as well as a lot of experimentation as to what this new expression of our life should be.

Since the 1960's we have definitely come to an understanding that we are not monastic. Though we are still defining the nuance that, while we are not monastic, how do we express a heightened emphasis on the contemplative aspect of our Franciscan charism? After Vatican II we have

reevaluated our constitutions a few times. Since the year 2000 there has been a settling of the dust. Little by little we seem to be more focused on further developing specific aspects of our Capuchin identity.

In the last 30 to 40 years, here in the United States, there has been more of a focus of "being with the poor". While some provinces have always participated in this aspect of our charism, some still find it a challenge to make this shift. All of the provinces in the US are continually redefining and discerning what this means for us. How do we nuance our approach to the ministries that we have, which ministries do we let go of, which ministries do we keep, and what new ministries do we move into given the complexities of the lower number of vocations and how will this all play out in the future as we further discern collaboration between the provinces.

Unification: Contemplation

Our Identity In Christ

So, are we totally confused about our identity yet? I believe there is a divine light shining the way for our Capuchin Franciscan Order. As I had mentioned in a past article, you don't have to be a Capuchin to be a Franciscan, but you do have to be a Franciscan to be a Capuchin. First and foremost, as sons of St. Francis, we find our identity in Christ! St. Francis states in the beginning of our Rule, "The Rule and life of the lesser brothers is this: to observe the holy Gospel of our Lord, Jesus Christ..." (Rule of 1223). How many times have we heard it re-translated in modern times as "**live** the holy Gospel of our Lord, Jesus Christ?" The Capuchin Constitutions state, "Therefore, we truly carry on a filial conversation with the Father when we **live** Christ..." (Cap. Const. 45:5).

St. Francis formed his whole Rule of life after the Gospels. This is the major difference between the Franciscan approach to religious life and the approach to religious life of the other Orders. While yes, the other Orders also take observing the Gospel seriously, the Rules of St. Benedict and St. Augustine were not formed after the Gospels, they were formed after the Acts of Apostles, the communal life of the first Christian community. (Acts 2:42-47). Vita Evangelica vs. Vita Apostolica.

Our Identity as Brother

Because we find our identity in Christ, the reason for everything we do should come from the life of Christ, given to us through the writings of the Gospels. Our identity as brother is modeled after Christ being the "firstborn of many brothers" (*Rms. 8:29*). We are brothers to others when we see Christ in ourselves (*2 Cor. 13:5*), and we are brothers to others when we see Christ in the other. (*Matt. 25:40*)

A few years ago, I was a member of the "Brothers Think Tank". This is a committee that was put together by one of our own Capuchins, John Pavlik, while he was the director of the Conference of Major Superiors of Men. On this committee were brothers from many different Orders of the Catholic Church. Our mission was to help promote the role of a lay brother within the Catholic Church. Many people know what a Priest is and what a Religious Sister is, but oddly enough very few know what a Religious Brother is.

At one of our meetings, a brother from one of the other Orders voice his displeasure with ordained members calling themselves "Brother". He felt that this took away from his identity as "Brother." When he said that, it helped me to understand in a deeper way that as a Capuchin Franciscan, when an ordained member calls himself "Brother," that's what **gives** me my identity.

Before Vatican II we were commonly referred to as "Capuchin Fathers." The shift of being known as "Father" to being now known as "Brother", has emerged over the last 70 years. A major factor has been the change of the role of the Capuchin Lay Brother. Before Vatican II the Capuchins, as did many of the mixed Orders, lived in a two-class system; Capuchin Priests and Lay Brothers. They didn't pray together - the Priests prayed the Liturgy of the Hours and the Lay Brothers recited a multitude of Our Fathers, even though by the 1900's most Lay Brothers could certainly read. Priests and Lay Brothers didn't recreate together. Even if there was only one Lay Brother in the friary, he recreated by himself, then had to clean the Priests recreation room.

Vatican II asked us to go back to the original charism of our founder. Over the last 70 years we have come to a deeper understanding of what that means. As a Capuchin Franciscan it shouldn't matter whether we are ordained or not; we are all "Brothers". This is why the generals of our Order refer to themselves, not as Father N., but always as Brother N. Our Capuchin Brother, Cardinal Sean O'Malley, often introduces himself as "Brother Sean". And as St. Francis stated in his Testament, "And the Lord gave me some **brothers**..." (Test. 14)

Our Identity in Fraternity

Another aspect of Capuchin Franciscan identity that we have focused on lately has been "fraternity." Fraternity is a huge part of our Capuchin Franciscan charism. Monks don't live in fraternity; they live in community. Who knew there was a difference, right? In community you are one among many. The Acts of the Apostles talks about forming communal life. However, fraternity is not one among many, but one entering into a more intimate relationship with each friar that they live with, respecting each friar for their own uniqueness and dignity; small fraternities vs. large communities. Four or five Diocesan Priests may live in the same rectory yet never eat or pray together. Jesuits recently received permission from Rome not to have to pray together.

A few years ago, I was on the Chapter Preparation Committee for my province. While in a meeting with the Provincial Council and the Chapter Facilitator (who was an ex-Jesuit), we were discussing how we were going to shape the proposed agenda for the upcoming chapter based on the feedback from the different area gatherings of our province. Mostly the friars from the province were asking for reflections on "fraternity". When the facilitator realized this, in his frustration he voiced, "No, it's the mission! The mission is the most important aspect!" At which point I explained to him, "You were a Jesuit, 'Whatever I can do For the Greater Glory of God!" (which is the Jesuit moto, "Ad Majorem Dei Gloriam") I continued, "That's good, but it's not us."

For Franciscans, the mission is extremely important. Without it we are not fully Franciscan. However, fraternity is more important. Why? Going back to our original identity in Christ, Christ lived in fraternity; in the Trinity and fraternity was the first thing Christ established *before* he began his public ministry. And again, I repeat St. Francis' statement from his Testament, "And the Lord gave me some brothers..." (*Test. 14*)

Action: Imitation

The Upcoming Generation

This upcoming generation seem to have a natural capacity for being "brother", a deeper yearning for equality. A couple years ago, a young novice voiced his confusion that, while we talk of everyone being brothers, he couldn't help but notice that there seemed to be a different level between the novices and the staff. While I'm sure now after a few years in formation he has a deeper appreciation for leadership in Franciscan formation, I thought his intent to be quite virtuous. This upcoming generation also seems to have a natural capacity for "fraternity". They enjoy being with each other and doing things together, almost as if they had a longing for it; much more so than in the past. I also believe that this upcoming generation will challenge us to a deeper sense of prayer and simplicity.

This upcoming generation is also calling us to a deeper sense of authenticity. "Are we who we say we are?" However, let us not confuse "authenticity" with "perfectionism". I believe all professed friars are living a somewhat authentic Capuchin Franciscan life, each of us in the gifts given to us by God. None of us live it perfectly, especially in the aspect of our charism that we fall short in and require care and patience from our "brothers" as we challenge each other in the continuing growth of our charism.

I am hopeful in the future of the Capuchin Franciscan Order as together we further deepen our Capuchin Franciscan identity, not by what we do, but by who we are and our approach to how we do it. How we minster as *brother*, in *fraternity*, out of our *prayer*, living in *simplicity*, by *living* the Gospel, by *living* Christ!

Thank you, Holy Spirit! You showered your gentle guidance down upon those seeking to know more about St. Francis, leading them to the St. Louis the King Fraternity and initial formation. Fifteen people heard your call and answered. Of those 15, eight are in Orientation and seven are in Candidacy with our fraternity at Old Mission Santa Barbara. In addition, one of our fraternity members is assigned to lead a group of eight people at Mission Santa Inez in their formation with hopes of forming their own fraternity.

When those in formation heard the call of the Holy Spirit, they searched in different ways to find a fraternity. One couple called 1-800 FRANCIS looking for the closest fraternity. Another person heard about us from a friend in formation with our fraternity. A notice about the Seculars in our church bulletin got someone else's attention. Personally, in 2018, I found the region's website and sent an email asking what fraternity is near me. I got an email back that day connecting me with Minister Gregg Garrison, OFS. He invited me and my husband to dinner that same night. Wiliam Wicks, OFS, a former National Minister, was also a dinner guest! Thank you, Holy Spirit, from all of us searching!

Once people find us, we talk with them about why they are interested in going through formation. One person said that at church, "I had been observing the friars and admired their simplicity and humility." Another person said, "The appeal is a few things. It is the warmth and authenticity of the fraternity as a group. There is a welcoming spirit with a sense of a faith-filled community."

The structure of formation is guided by our Rule, General Constitutions, National Statutes, and Regional Governance Norms. Each formation leader uses that guidance while adding their own creativity to present the formation meetings. For Candidacy formation, I asked each of the seven candidates to choose one of the remaining meetings before profession in the Spring to present a short talk on a Franciscan theme. In addition, the candidate leads everyone in discussion about the chapter in *The Franciscan Journey* for that month. At a recent meeting, one of the candidates created a PowerPoint about YouFra - the worldwide Franciscan-centered youth groups.

Michael Aberle, OFS, is leading the new Orientation group of eight using *The Franciscan Journey*. He first had the group look at the preface which lists that newcomers are invited to become people:

- A) with a Franciscan spirit, perspective and ideals;
- B) with the ability to reflect the gospel in their lives and accept conversion;
- C) with a willingness to accept the OFS as a primary and permanent commitment;
- D) with a desire to build up the Church and the Kingdom of God;
- E) with a sense of Franciscan responsibility for social action;
- F) with a desire for contemplative prayer.

Michael said he sees this "as a guide for how to allow the Holy Spirit to form us as Secular Franciscans in our vocation."

Lawrence Nichols, OFS is our fraternity member leading the eight people in formation at the Santa Ines Mission in Solvang. The group has sent a letter of request to our regional minister seeking official acceptance as a newly forming group. At their second Saturday of the month meetings, Lawrence uses *The Franciscan Journey* as the primary guide. He asks the members to select their favorite questions from the assigned chapter. Then they discuss the questions together. Lawrence said, "Some of our most memorable moments have come from the generosity and joy of our group - especially when one of the members shared gifts with us from her recent pilgrimage. Moments like these deepen our fellowship and remind us of the beauty of our shared journey."

The beauty of our shared journey that Lawrence mentions is close to all our hearts in our fraternity. We are truly blessed to have 15 people in initial formation, and to be supporting a newly forming group. Thank you, Holy Spirit!

Looking at Laudato Si, Brother Keith noted that Pope Francis references St. Francis nine times and uses the term "integral ecology" (found in paragraph 10), which means the awareness that people are interdependent on each other. Both documents guide us in living our Franciscan charism. Our fraternity was blessed with this insightful and instructional presentation.


- A letter detailing the activity, the date it occurred, the number of fraternity members involved, and the amount of expenses incurred.

- To befriend the poor and vulnerable

Premier performances are being planned for Los Angeles, Buffalo, and Boston in 2026 - with a future performance envisioned for Assisi. The Los Angeles performance makes this a beautiful opportunity for all of us in Southern California to join with the global Franciscan family in honoring this milestone through the unifying power of art and spirit.

When offered an opportunity to support this effort along leaders of the Franciscan orders here in the United States, the **St. Francis Region of the Secular Franciscan Order** happily joined in to provide spiritual and financial support.
