Nearts on Fire for the Lord!

LOOKING BACK - AND FORWARD!

My brothers and sisters,

Because of personal problems of our newsletter editor, this will probably be the only newsletter we are able to get out this year. Therefore, with an election coming up in January, I'd like to take this opportunity to look back over the last three years, and perhaps to look forward a bit.

The Regional Executive Council (REC) began our term in 2009 by announcing a theme of *Hearts on Fire for the Lord!* Thanks to the research and work of Judith Mussatto, our secretary, we were able to order and make available to everyone, refrigerator magnets (combined with a picture frame) with that theme printed on it in four languages. I hope that everyone has looked at that magnet every day and reminded themselves that we are a Gospel people and need to be such convinced and determined Gospel people that we live that Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ a little better each day and each day finds us with new and greater enthusiasm for our Gospel life.

Each year, the REC - along with the

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district liaisons and all of the Regional Spiritual Assistants and an occasional invited guest - has had a week-end retreat. That week-end together, early in each year, has given your elected council an opportunity to begin their year's work on a spiritual high note, as well as to have an opportunity to do some planning for the year and to bond with each other. It has made our work for you immensely more fruitful. I have regularly recommended to new councils that they do their best to plan a retreat for their council, for all the same reasons. Those who have done so will echo my comments on how much it helped the counsel to work together during the year

Over the three years we lost only one of our elected council - councilor Robert Lopez. He was replaced by Margarita Rodriguez, who was appointed councilor by the REC. Also serving on the REC has been Bob Murray, as the appointed Regional Formation Director. We also lost one of our Regional Spiritual Assistants, all of whom were appointed by the three Provincials of the OFMs, OFM Conventuals and OFM Capuchins. That was Anthony H.V. Le, who was forced to resign because of serious health problems. We still need to keep him in our prayers.

At our Chapter gathering in 2010, we were fortunate to have Bob "Fitz" national Fitzsimmons, formation director, spend the week-end with us and give us several sessions of ongoing formation, emphasizing the need for each and every member to be on fire for the Lord. At the Chapter in 2011, we had Visitation from NAFRA (which is discussed elsewhere in this newsletter), and included ongoing formation with Fr. Lester Bach. The Chapter in 2012 will be elections for the Region. I encourage all of you to be thinking and praying about those you would

like to have serve at the Region level. Remember that elections should be infused by the Holy Spirit and the Spirit should guide our nominations and our votes. Information about nominations and a form will be found elsewhere in this newsletter.

We had a presentation on the H_20 (water) project at our 2010 Chapter gathering, and fraternities have been diligently gathering funds for that project ever since. In 2010 our Region raised the most funds of any region in the U.S. for the water project, and it has continued to be an ongoing effort in most of our fraternities.

Remember that elections should be infused by the Holy Spirit and the Spirit should guide our nominations and our votes.

We have spent substantial time with local fraternities, far more than just the By the end of this mandated visits. year, 2011, we will, since January of 2009, have handled 32 elections and made 46 visits to fraternities. In 2009 we had two meetings with the outgoing LSA/F (Lay Spiritual Assistant/ Formator) class and two with the incoming class. We have had six REC (Regional Executive Council) meetings each year, and over the three-year period, presented 15 formation seminars (three seminars each done once in each district). In 2010, four newly forming groups were elevated to EC status and two EC asked to become fraternities. Two fraternities were deactivated due to lack of membership. In 2010 two fraternities - one Korean and one Spanish - were canonically established, with their Mass of Establishment celebrated by the OFM Provincial, and with the Provincial Spiritual Assistant also in attendance. Each year we have had a Regional Gathering. In 2010 the Regional Gatherings were done by language groups, at their request. We had a picnic in June of 2011 that was a Regional Gathering, and that was enjoyed by all who attended. The LSA/F class begun in 2010 started with 23 members and is going strong.

Our major need continues to be more and better formation at every level, and more spiritual assistants. We expect to have a substantial number of certified Lav Spiritual Assistants from the current LSA/F class when it finishes, including Spiritual Assistants to serve all of our language communities. However, we still won't have enough to go around. In order to serve all of our forming groups, those on the REC who are Spiritual Assistants also serve local fraternities and forming groups. Formation has been listed as the number one priority in the world by CIOFS. Nine members of St. Francis Region attended the National Formation Workshop given in May by our National Formation Director and his team. We came home with a 460-page manual and a full CD of resource material. We have been working on it since then, and will begin formation workshops after the first of the year, to be attended by fraternity formation directors, their teams, AND their councils. Our annual retreat at Serra in May, 2012, will feature Bob Fitzsimmons, National Formation Director, and Fr. Richard Trezza, OFM, Spiritual Assistant to the national formation team and an active contributor to the two-year work of that team.

In the past three years, our Scholarship Fund has grown and we've been able to use it to send people to workshops and seminars and to bring speakers to our Region. We've established a translation



fund to help bring about timely translations for our language groups. While expenses for everything have increased steadily - or sometimes by leaps and bounds - especially gasoline, making mileage our single biggest yearly expense, we've still managed to keep our expenses below our income each year and will continue to work in that direction.

I have had a wonderful council to work with over the last three years, and I feel privileged in having been able to serve you during that time. It has been a true joy in my life and I hope I've been able to convey some of that joy to each of you. I hope to continue to be able to serve the Order, whether again as Minister or in whatever other capacity our Lord wishes for me.

Help is on the Way

October of 2000 seems like yesterday at times. That is when I became Regional Minister of St. Francis Region. Lord, so many changes. New Constitutions in December of 2000. New National



Statutes in 2002 (approved by Rome in July, 2003). New Regional Governance Norms to comply with the new Constitutions and National Statutes.

Steve Gross, OFM Conv., with the permission of the three Provincial Ministers of the First Order, started the first class of Lay Spiritual Assistants (LSAs) in January of 2005 and certified SAs in July 2006. The second class began right away and several more SAs were certified in 2009. Most of us in the first two classes are hard at work doing our best. However, there is still that void of SAs for fraternities that is unacceptably too large.

Help is on the way. Right now, we have the largest class of SAs well on their way to bring help to our Region.

They have been hard at work learning what Formation is all about, plus the wisdom to serve as SA. We were blessed with the new Formation material and topics that CIOFS and NAFRA wanted us to add this year to the Guidelines to Initial Formation list of statutory topics to cover in Orientation, Inquiry and Candidacy in St. Francis Region. CIOFS and NAFRA, job well done. Our Formation programs are now more complete than ever. The new material will be coming to you soon. Much to do in the way of logistics, translations, printing etc. It will be worth the wait.

I will not go so far as to tell you when certification will take place, but I will say this "they will be ready when they are ready."

I love this job even more.

Formation Our Way of Life

Have you ever wondered what Jesus was really saying to Nicodemus in Chapter 3 of John's Gospel? Obviously, Nicodemus did not understand Jesus, and possibly being facetious,



Nicodemus asks if a man can re-enter the womb and be born again. He did not realize that Jesus was asking him to re-form his life; to repent, to convert, to become a new man in the eyes of God.

We each were mysteriously formed in the womb and, once born, our bodies continued being formed and transformed bringing us to adulthood. Along that path to adulthood we grew in stature, knowledge, understanding, wisdom and faith. Even today, our transformation is not complete – we continue to be transformed physically, mentally and spiritually, thus becoming new individuals each day. We are not the same today as we were yesterday, yet becoming the men and women God has called us to become. We are being formed and re-formed in God's image each day.

St. Francis became aware that change was necessary in his life, that he was called to follow Christ by living the Gospel. As we follow St. Francis' lead, Secular Franciscans, as well as the Friars and the Poor Clares, strive to follow Christ wholeheartedly. Our respective Rules require us to read and know the Gospel and then incorporate its message and values into our lives. As we live

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this commitment we allow the Gospel message to be seen and experienced in the world today.

Like St. Francis, we Secular Franciscans take change in our life, this growth in our faith life, seriously. We work toward it through a process we call FORMATION.

This formation process first began when we wondered "who are the Secular Franciscans and what are they all about?" From that time onward through Orientation, Inquiry and Candidacy, FORMATION became our way of life. Indeed, formation did not stop following our Profession. Our formation is never complete. It continues for a lifetime. It is an essential part of our lives.

By following our Rule of Life, we drink in the "life giving" Word of God. We drink the "life-giving" Blood of Christ in the Eucharist so that Christ may live in us. Just as "life giving" water flowed from the rock at Massah and Meribah *(EX. 17:1-7)*, Formation is "life giving" because it waters us allowing us to grow and change in the eyes of God.

Every fraternity, at each level, is to have a formation program. Each fraternity, (local, regional, national, international), offers "On-Going" Formation during its regular meetings. Additionally, local fraternities offer "Initial Formation" to those who are considering a vocation to the Order.

Each fraternity's Council is responsible for formation within its fraternity. Each fraternity has a Formation Director (or Master of Formation) to oversee the fraternity's formation program. Additionally, the Regional Executive Council (REC) is responsible for formation within its territory. Similarly, a National Executive Council (NEC) is always concerned about formation within its National boundaries, and at CIOFS (the International Executive

Council) formation is at the top of its list of priorities for the entire Order.

During the past few years it became quite apparent to CIOFS (International) that Formation within the Order was inadequate worldwide, thus spurring a tremendous effort to correct the deficiency. After several years' work, the initial effort to build additional formation material to meet the need was finally completed. This material was then forwarded to the various National Fraternities so that it would be incorporated worldwide!

Here in the U.S.A., our NEC (National Executive Council) delegated the National Formation Director and the National Formation Team to write, organize and arrange the material for use in this country." This required a considerable effort by very dedicated and committed Secular Franciscans, and in May of this year, the material was presented to Formation Directors, Spiritual Assistants and Regional Councils from around the nation at Our Lady of the Snows in Illinois. More than 130 attended, secular and religious. Ten were from our Region! And what a meeting it was! It was invigorating! It was exciting! And it was... WOW !!!

The National Formation Team felt their important resulting product should have a name... perhaps even an acronym... They called it "The FUN Book", in remembrance of St. Francis' words of "For Up to Now... we have done nothing". Currently, work is underway in St. Francis Region to prepare teams to present this FUN Book's material to each of our local fraternity Councils, Formation Directors and Spiritual Our initial hope was to Assistants. bring the excitement and wonder of this material to a council near you sometime in the fall of this year, but realistically, it is much more likely to begin early in 2012. Why? There is Soooo much for the presenters to understand and assimilate. Not only that, the "FUN Book" is not yet complete! Additional material is being added to it periodically. Whew! Much to do to bring it to you!

As mentioned above, the REC is responsible for formation within its Region. In June of this year, at our St. Francis Region's REC meeting, a vote was taken to mandate that this material be <u>required</u> for profession... *in addition to...* the requirements found in our "Guidelines for Initial Formation" (the official document mandating the minimum formation requirements at each stage of initial formation in the USA).

The vote was unanimous and, yes, Orientation, Inquiry and Candidacy will each now take a little longer. However, those to eventually be professed will have a much better understanding of what it means *to be* Secular Franciscan. And, as I said earlier, *this additional formation is required for profession in our Region.* The additional time spent in Initial Formation will be well worth it as Secular Franciscans around the world will "be on the same page" because our formation will have become more comprehensive.

But there is more! Across the nation it is felt that the resources found in the Fun Book should be incorporated into every fraternity's On-Going Formation Program. Due to long-term poor formation standards world-wide, our Order has missed so much over the years and, now, we have an opportunity to recapture and deepen our understanding of what our Rule and documents call us to in the life of the Church.

We have been blessed by God with our leadership at CIOFS, the NEC and our REC. They have worked hard for us. Now it's our turn. So, look for it! It's coming! It's time for F.U.N.! As St. Francis said as he lay dying:

"For Up till Now (FUN) we have done nothing". Let us begin again!

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2011 National Formation Workshop

The day had arrived. We were at the National Formation Workshop, *Forming the Formator*, at Our Lady of the Snows Shrine in Belleview, Illinois. All 120 of us were there from all over the

United States, from National, Regional and Local levels.

This week is the result of over nine years of preparation. In 2002, CIOFS made Formation its top priority. The project led to International Formation Courses in Rome during 2006 and 2007 attended by International Councilors and National Formators from all over the world. We were able to obtain some of the materials, and with the call from CIOFS to local SFO to pray for, prepare for and provide input for the 2008 International Chapter, we prepared the CIOFS project which was presented in fraternities across St. Francis Region in the Spring and Summer of 2008. The theme was Profession and Our belonging to a worldwide order. This theme was continued in the monthly ongoing formation topics from CIOFS for 2010. Meanwhile, CIOFS gathered the course materials, expanded them and prepared an Initial Formation Manual.

Formation remained as the top priority at the 2008 International Chapter. The Formation Manual will be expanded as additional topics are developed and will be extended beyond Initial Formation to Ongoing Formation.

CIOFS asked each national fraternity to take the formation materials presented by International and prepare methods (workshops, manuals, etc.) to convey the formation materials to their regions and regions to their local fraternities. NAFRA's formation team took on the project of preparing a manual and workshop to train formators in each region. At the NAFRA chapter meeting in 2009, we received a sample of some of their work. After two years of preparation, they were ready.

The concept was simple. To have uniformity in the SFO, there needed to be uniformity in formation. The purpose of the International courses and manual was to train national formators in content and methodology. The national formators were to train the regional formators, adapting materials and methods applicable to their nation. The regional formators are to train the local formators, adapting to their regions. The expected result: all SFO members throughout the world would have a common identity.

Now we are at the workshop. We are given a large manual and a CD. The manual is about 460 pages. It is called the FUN manual from its title, For Up to *Now.* Wow! Surely we are not going to go through this in 2 or 3 days. We quickly found out that the manual is a resource covering the essential topics needed for Initial Formation. Each section varies in form and content as sections were written by different authors. We learned that we can use each section and supplement them with other resources in preparing our formation lessons. The accompanying CD contained many additional documents, many of which we have seen in the past. It is a nice collection of documents in one place. We also have many formation books written during recent years that are available for use. We are here to learn how to put the materials together and methods of presentations.

The workshop included six presentations covering four topics: Formation;

Ecclesiology; Vocation, Mission and Charism; Profession (2 sessions); and Franciscan Theology (2 sessions).

Each presenter used a different style. Some used power point presentations, some used handouts, some held a dialog with the group as they went through. Several shared personal experiences. We saw how different presentation methods had different effects and how the type can depend on the kind of material being presented. All presenters were very effective and well received. They showed careful preparation and a thorough knowledge of their topic, something we all need to keep in mind.

In most cases, presentations were followed by small group discussions and summaries by each group. Groups consisted of about 6 persons. For two discussions we were asked to divide a table into groups of 2 and 3 persons. This made for better sharing. Then these smaller groups shared with the other groups around a table.

We had social and sharing time at the workshop as well. We were on equal levels, regardless of our titles or positions – those attending were regional ministers, regional formators, local formators, and others from all levels of the SFO. We were all there to learn to improve formation in our organizations. We formed a fraternity of 120 persons who ate, talked and shared our lives and thoughts with one another. That was a part of the lesson in formation as well.

Before returning home, we were given our assignment. We are to bring the training we received back to our regions by training our local formators. Each region is to work out its own method. Only after training was the *FUN* manual to be distributed. In St. Francis Region, we are preparing workshops for local fraternity formation teams, councils and spiritual assistants to attend. Workshops will be announced later.

Chúng tôi cũng được tham dự Thánh Lễ vào sáng thứ sáu 5/13 và chiều thứ bảy 5/14.


Sáng Chúa nhật sau khi ăn sáng và đọc kinh sáng ,chúng tôi có thảo luận đúc kết buổi hội thão.

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FORMATION FROM NAFRA



Nine people from the St. Francis Region, along with Fr. Steve Gross, O.F.M. Conv., traveled to St. Louis, MO in May for the long-awaited Formation Workshop National based on the materials provided to the national fraternities by CIOFS after the International Chapter of Elections in 2008. It was an intense four days of ongoing formation for all in attendance, which included not only a representation of our National Executive Council, and regional ministers and formation directors, but even some local ministers and

formation directors. We came away with a 460-page printed manual, and a CD with even more on it. We had told many of you that we did not know what we would receive and were waiting for the workshop. What we received was resource material - not a "formation book" to be used in initial formation. Even with the four-day program, there were only presentations on about half the material in the manual.

We have been busy working on putting together an appropriate workshop program from this material ever since we returned. Our plans, if approved by the new council, are to begin workshops after the Chapter of Elections in January. They will probably be scheduled in each district, so that no one has a great distance to travel. ALL fraternity formation directors, formation teams, and councils should plan to attend. The workshop in St. Louis was billed as "Forming the Formators", and there was no doubt left that our job was to come home and get this information into the hands of local formators, whose job, then, is to get it to all members of St. Francis Region. To present this much material is a massive undertaking, and will be done in small pieces.

Below is the beginning of our approach to forming a Franciscan person, shown in a circle. One is first a human being. We are also a Christian Catholic human being. Along the journey moving through




The END GAME, a balance of the above Secular Franciscan Charisms. These 3 charisms must become part of the Franciscan's DNA during the process of Formation in their lifetime, with as much change as possible during the three phases of Formation on the journey to Profession.

those first two pieces of the pie come Baptism, First Communion, Confirmation and, for many of us, the Sacrament of Matrimony. During the time we are moving through the second piece of the pie, we begin our journey towards becoming a Secular Franciscan, starting with Orientation, then Inquiry, and finally, after much discernment to know that we have a vocation to the SFO, Candidacy. When we are professed we have just barely made out way into the beginning of the third piece of the pie. The rest of our lives will be devoted, though daily conversion and ongoing formation, to becoming more and more the Gospel person

we are called to be.

Put another way, we can follow our Pathway to Profession shown in the second chart (next page), starting with First Contacts and moving along the road to the Rite of Profession. Notice the emphasis on discernment all along the road to Profession. And then, once we reach Profession, that is just the beginning of the next road that takes us through the rest of our lives. At that point, we have just moved into the third piece of the pie in the circle. With really good formation, that lifestyle that just begins at Profession will take each of us closer and closer to the heart of Jesus as we move through life. The manual we received is called the FUN manual, entitled, For Up to Now (we have done nothing). What a model for living!










ANNUAL CHAPTER - JOY OF GATHERING IN CHAPTER

After a period of time for round table discussions including ideas for the future, discussions on information from higher councils and other relevant topics, the entire fraternity heard closing remarks from Fr. Lester and Arturo, as well as from Elaine and Michelle. The Chapter was officially closed with prayer at about noon. Immediately afterward, the Korean communities gathered for an afternoon with Michelle Kim.

JUSTICE, PEACE AND INTEGRITY OF CREATION - JPIC

JPIC has incorporated most of the previous "commissions", and encompasses our Rule, articles 15 through 18. Just as it took us years to finally become active with the commissions, we are not yet doing very well with JPIC. Many fraternities do not even have a JPIC chairman. Since it encompasses such a big part of our rule, we need to take it more seriously and become more involved in all aspects of justice, peace and integrity of creation.



Those are very broad topics that include so very many of today's major issues:

immigration, affordable housing, environment, death penalty, abortion, hunger - both here and abroad, child abuse, child abandonment, fair trade, police brutality, and much more. Many of your fraternities are actively involved in ministries that fall under the JPIC category, without even being aware that they do. You need a JPIC chairman so that reports of those activities can be kept and shared with others.

Our national chairman of JPIC - Kent Ferris - has been holding almost monthly Webinars in which anyone can participate. NAFRA has been working with Catholic Relief Services on a theme this year of "Catholics Confront Global Poverty." You can view all of the past ones at the following websites:

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Saint Francis Region Retreat, 2011

The Retreat theme was "Francis writes to the Secular Franciscans" and was lead by Fr. Joseph P Chinnici, OFM a leading Franciscan theologian and president of the Franciscan Theologian School at Berkley CA. Over three days he used the first letter St Francis wrote to the Secular Franciscans and helped us look at how it applied to our vocation today. After each of the talks we broke into small groups to share our thoughts about the talk and discuss the questions he provided. It was interesting to hear different perspectives. In one discussion we had a Secular who had never thought of the concept of "neighbor" as someone other than the person next door or who was at least someone they knew personally.

Here is the sermon he gave at our final Mass.

The first reading has that very short line

in it. It says, "There was great joy in the city."

Why was there great joy? Because the Disciples of Jesus had come and preached the good news. It was as simple as that.

When we see the world, and you see the world as it is, in your families, in your work place, in your home, the big world we read about in the paper, we don't read about a lot of joy. But a Franciscan sees the world the way God sees the world. A Franciscan loves the world the way God loves the world, with great mercy, with great compassion. Today in our world, Christians are, to some extent, given a bad name and sometimes we can wonder, who is the God we are preaching? The second reading tells us, be prepared to give a reason for the hope that is within you. Who is the God that we, as Secular Franciscans, preach? Our God's name is 'Good'. Our God's name is 'Love'. Our God is someone who invites the whole world into life. And I suspect that one reason we are here this weekend, one reason we have been given our vocations as a Friar Minor or Secular Franciscan is to preach this God in the world so that there might be joy in the city, joy in our families, joy in our work places, joy in the big broad world.

The world needs to see the life of God in our life of faith, demonstrated, made visible, made attractive, made uplifting, made encouraging. The world does not need judgment and condemnation, it has plenty of that, and it does it to itself. The world needs a word of salvation and life. A calling to a Super Abundant God. The world does not need a God who is invisible. Who is far across the sea. Or on top of the mountain. The world needs a God whose love is made visible and clear. Blessed are those who hear the word of God and do it. We have all the tools. We have the path, the Great Commandment(s). We have the privilege our vocation. The task is simple,

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let's live in such a way that the world will see who God truly is, a God of goodness and a God of love. That we are ones who love ourselves and love our neighbor. And love this God with our whole heart, our soul, our strength, our mind. That is Francis' letter to the Secular Franciscans.

So we can see why in this life Francis concludes his letter with these words, "Oh how glorious it is to have a holy and great father in heaven. Oh how holy and an consoling to have such a beautiful and wonderful spouse. Oh how holy and loving, wonderful, gratifying, humbling, peace giving, sweet, worthy of love and above all things desirable, to have such a brother and such a son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, who laid down is life for his sheep and prays to his Father always.

And when we rise to difficulty, because the world does not understand us, unless we show it to you, when we run into it, let us remember, He was there first. And glories with us. And we dwell in His Spirit, and God, Creator Redeemer, Consoler, the one who promises the beatitudes is with us always, even to the end of time. And so Francis says when he runs into difficulty, I have a son and a brother and a savior who prays to his Father and says,

"Holy Father, in your Name save those who you have given me, They were yours and you gave them to me. The words you have given to me I have given to them, and they accepted them and believed in truth that I have come from you and you have sent me. I pray for them and not for the world. Bless and sanctify them. I sanctify myself for them. I pray not only for them but for those who will believe in me through their word that they may be sanctified and be one as we are one. I wish, Father, that where I am they also may be there with me, that they may see my glory in your kingdom."

With a message like that, why would there not be joy in the city. Thank you for being messengers of peace.

The theme is: *Why Francis? Claim the Gift!* The daily themes are:


- Tuesday: Opening liturgy;

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



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YOU, TOO, CAN HELP!

Two fraternities in the St. Francis Region received large bequests in recent years from members who remembered the fraternity in their Wills. It was a gift of \$20,000 from one of those fraternities that started our scholarship fund, without which attendance at many seminars and workshops and speakers brought to the Region would not have been possible. We would like to encourage all of you to remember St. Francis Region in your Wills. Any amount left to the Region - whether large or small - will be gratefully received and very much appreciated, as prices continue to rise but incomes do not. In order to be effective within the Region, the REC has to be able to reimburse its members for out-of-pocket expenses, such as making copies, gas mileage for driving all over the Region, for paper and supplies, and various other expenses that go with serving a Region with almost 900 members in it. If your fraternity tends to have financial problems, you might consider leaving part to your fraternity and part to the Region.

Under the old rule, all professed members were required to have a Will. That provision is not in the Rule of 1978, but it is found in our General Constitutions (Art. 23.3) in response to Art. 19 of our Rule, and states the reason why we should have a Will. Therefore, the reason still exists As people of peace, we want to make it as easy as possible for our loved ones when we pass on to our heavenly reward. Part of what we can do is to make sure that we have made it very clear to all the family where our possessions (money, houses, cars, things IN the house, and other possessions) are to be distributed. If we do not, our heirs will quite likely end up in court, and then, no matter who we wanted to receive those items, the ones who will get most of what we left will be the lawyers. So we all should have a clearly stated and up-to-date Will .

We are only asking that when you make or update your Will, you consider leaving something to St. Francis Region. A bequest is very simple to make. You need only insert language in your Will or Trust as follows:

"I give the sum of ______ DOLLARS [written out in words] (______) [written in figures [OR, in the alternative] ______ PERCENT [written out in words] (______) [written in numbers] of the residue of my estate to St. Francis Region of the Secular Franciscan Order, a charitable religious organization, for its general purposes. The Region is represented by the Minister of the Region, whose name and address can be obtained from the National Fraternity of the Secular Franciscan order in the United States. Their contact information is on their website at <u>http://www.NAFRA-sfo.org</u>.

You need to know the difference between leaving a certain sum and leaving a percentage of the residue. When you leave a certain sum, it is a "specific bequest" and will be given to the beneficiary before the remainder of your estate is distributed. When you leave a percentage of the residue, the percentage will be taken from what is left after all of your specific bequests have been made. For example, if at your death your estate was worth \$100,000, if you left \$40,000 to the Region, with the remainder to be divided equally amount your four children, the four children would divide \$60,000 - what's left AFTER the \$40,000 was paid. If you left 20% of your estate to each of your four children, and left 10% of the residue to the Region, each child would get \$20,000, and the Region would get 10% of \$20,000 - the amount left after the children get their shares, and that 10% would be \$2,000. So if your estate decreases as the years go by, you can see the difference that the words of the bequest would make in how much everyone actually received. For a much more detailed explanation, you need to talk to a lawyer skilled at writing Wills and Trusts.

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
